National Border Collie Club Agenda

The NBCC will be having a meeting of delegates on the 23rd April at the National show. The following agenda items will be discussed and then voted on at a later meeting. We ask for input from all members prior to this initial meeting. Please send in your responses

1) Topic: NBCC running expenses

Rationale:

There are normal ongoing expenses incurred by the NBCC eg postage, affiliation fees, maintenance of web site and so on. To allow these to be paid in a timely manner the delegates should be contacted by e-mail and notified that an account has been received and requires payment. Delegates should be given a reply-by date (7 days) in which time if they have any objection or further questions they should respond to the NBCC Secretary by e-mail and cc in all other delegates or they approve the request.

This process is to be applied for individual accounts totalling \$300 or less.

A summary of expenses should be posted quarterly on the NBCC website so that it is available to any member.

For amounts over \$300 it may be appropriate for the delegates to liaise with their member club and therefore the reply timeframe would be extended.

The following motion to be considered when appropriate notification to member clubs and timeframes have been met.

Motion: The delegates are able to approve NBCC expenditure of \$300 or less. The delegates will be given 7 days to reply. A lack of reply will be taken as a positive response.

2) Topic: Conference of National Breed Councils

Rationale:

NBCC representative will be there to speak on any of the items submitted by the NBCC or any other relevant issue

The NBCC representative can provide a summary of the conference to the members of the NBCC within one month of the conference.

The NBCC will pay reasonable costs for a representative.

The following motion to be considered when appropriate notification to member clubs and timeframes have been met.

Motion: The NBCC Submit to the ANKC the names of one or two representatives by the 26 July to attend the Conference of National Breed Councils to be held on the 26th August 2006 in Sydney.

3) Topic: Recognition of International Sheep Dog Society (ISDS) registered Border Collies in Australia

Background: International Sheep Dog Society (ISDS)

"In 1873 the first recorded sheep dog trials were held in Bala, North Wales, but it was not until 33 years later that the International Sheep Dog Society (ISDS) was formed, following a meeting of English and Scottish sheepmen in 1906. Shortly afterwards the first International Trials were held in Gullane, Scotland and, except during the war years, have continued to be an annual event.

Now, almost a hundred years later, the ISDS has over 5,000 members from all over the world - and not just from the obvious sheep concentrations such as Australia and New Zealand, but also from the Americas, South Africa, The Falklands, Scandinavia, the Middle East and the continent of Europe, to say nothing of a growing interest in Japan! Each year sees quite a few of our overseas members in the U.K. as spectators at our National and International Trials. They come, not only to see the finest dogs in

competition and to learn from their handlers, but also to assess the dogs' ability for their own requirements 'back home' - wherever that may be - and then seek to buy the dogs, or more specifically their progeny. The U.K. is very much the 'kennel of the world' as far as the working sheep dog is concerned.

A Purpose

The ISDS was founded with the intention of stimulating interest in the shepherd and his calling and to secure the better management of stock by improving the shepherd's dog. This is still the intention today, for without a good working dog the

work of the shepherd, both on the hills and the lowlands would be impossible. One good dog can do the work of a dozen men, as the shepherd is the first to testify. Indeed British agriculture owes a tremendous debt to these hard working collies and all too often, perhaps, their efforts and praise remain unsung - but they are never under-estimated! So the constant improvement of these dogs is a prime requirement.

To help to facilitate this, in 1955, the Society produced its first Stud Book in which pedigrees had been researched back to the early 1900s, commencing with the famous Old Maid. Today, the pedigrees of over 6500 puppies continue to be registered each year and in 2000 the 250,000th dog was registered. Records are compiled under the direction of Mr Norman Lorton, who took over as Chief Executive and Keeper of the Stud Book in 2001. The Stud Book of the ISDS is the principal work of reference concerning such pedigrees in the world. It is therefore invaluable for those serious breeders who continue to seek excellence in the working sheep dog, conscious of the part that pedigrees play in enhancing the skills of the breeder and assisting him to produce better and better dogs. “

Rationale:

Our current Australian Border Collies originated from imported ISDS registered dogs.

The ANKC therefore recognised these ISDS dogs and issued ANKC registration to their offspring.

Many countries Kennel Clubs recognise ISDS registration and grant their own equivalent registration when these dogs are imported. ISDS dogs continue to enter the ANKC by way of registration with other Kennel Clubs from around the world when these dogs are imported into Australia.

We are unable to find when and why the ANKC ceased to recognise the ISDS registration. It may be that for some time no one applied for recognition of ISDS dogs and with changes to technology and staff this may have been overlooked.

Being able to utilize the ISDS dogs within Australia would provide an increase to the genetic diversity available.

The Border Collie is regarded as the world's premier herding dog and members would again like to utilise the attributes offered by ISDS registered dogs.

We do not expect there to be a high demand due to the costs associated with importation and so on. ISDS dogs have been imported into Australia and New Zealand from the earliest times and there continues to be a small flow of these dogs into Australia. However these dogs are currently unavailable to be utilized by ANKC breeders.

National Breed Council agenda items need to be submitted to the ANKC by 29th May to be considered at their next meeting.

The following motion to be considered when appropriate notification to member clubs and timeframes have been met.

Motion: The NBCC write to the ANKC requesting that ISDS registered dogs be recognised in Australia and granted ANKC registration.

4) Topic: Changes to the Border Collie Breed Standard

Rationale:

Over two years ago the NBCC established a working party to survey the members (of the member clubs) in relation to the current Border Collie breed standard.

The following process was undertaken;

All members through their clubs newsletters were asked to submit suggestions for changes to the breed standard

These changes then were collated and redistributed out to members to be voted on

The votes were counted and members notified of the results

There were a few areas where the original wording was not clear enough & these areas were expanded

These then also were distributed to members for voting

The votes of this second round were counted and members notified of the results

The areas of the breed standard as passed by the votes were rewritten to incorporate these changes

The view of the ANKC is that the formation of a National Breed Council is the formal mechanism to liaise with the owners/breeders of that particular breed.

If individuals want to have a say and be involved in matters affecting that breed they should be a member of a Breed Club that forms part of the National Breed Council.

The ANKC only surveys owners of a specified breed through all state journals on issues relating to litter registrations i.e. health testing requirements before litters are registered. This is only done at the request of the National Breed Council. The ANKC does not survey all owners in this way for any other matter.

the opportunity to be involved, we will have to commence this process from the beginning. Each phase will have to be advertised in every state journal and the NBCC pay for the cost. Based on the previous process the cost and time would be considerable.

The members have already passed the amendments by the way in which they cast their vote.

This process meets the requirements of the constitution of the NBCC, the constitution of the State Controlling bodies and the State Border Collie Clubs' constitutions, none of which require non-member owners to be consulted.

The NBCC then should now conclude this process and submit these Breed Standard Amendments to the ANKC for consideration.

National Breed Council agenda items need to be submitted to the ANKC by 29th May to be considered at their next meeting.

Results from the Breed Standard Survey

The survey results have indicated that the majority wish to make the following amendments to the breed standard. These changes should now be submitted to the ANKC for consideration.

CHARACTERISTICS Existing Standard

Characteristics □ The Border Collie is highly intelligent, with an instinctive tendency to work and is readily responsive to training. Its keen, alert and eager expression add to its intelligent appearance, whilst its loyal and faithful nature demonstrates that it is at all times kindly disposed towards stock. Any aspect of structure or temperament foreign to a working dog is uncharacteristic.

Amended

Temperament □ (See under Characteristics)

Characteristics - The Border Collie is highly intelligent, with an instinctive tendency to work and is readily responsive to training. Its temperament is stable, biddable, loyal and faithful, but with attention directed toward its owner/handler. It is willing to please, with no sign of timidity or aggression. Its keen, alert and eager expression adds to its intelligent appearance, whilst its loyal and faithful nature demonstrates that it is at all times kindly disposed towards stock. Any sign of aggression is uncharacteristic of this breed and should not be tolerated.

GENERAL APPEARANCE Existing Standard

General Appearance □ The general appearance shall be that of a well proportioned dog, the smooth outline showing quality, gracefulness and perfect balance, combined with sufficient substance to ensure that it is capable of enduring long periods of active duty in its intended task as a working sheep dog. Any tendency to coarseness or weediness is undesirable.

Amended

General Appearance - The general appearance shall be that of a well proportioned dog, the smooth outline showing quality, gracefulness and perfect balance, combined with sufficient substance to ensure that it is capable of enduring long periods of active duty in its intended task as a working sheep dog. Any tendency to coarseness or weediness is undesirable. The male should be masculine and the female feminine in appearance.

HEAD Existing Standard

Head □ The skull is broad and flat between the ears, slightly narrowing to the eye, with a pronounced stop, cheeks deep but not prominent. The muzzle tapering to the nose, is strong and the same length as the skull. The lips are tight and clean and the nose is large with open nostrils. The nose colour in all dogs will be a solid colour with no pink or light pigment, and shall complement the background colour of the dog.

Amended

Head - The skull is broad and flat between the ears, slightly narrowing to the eye, with a pronounced stop, cheeks deep but not prominent. The muzzle should be well rounded with a flat bridge, not narrow, with a moderately strong chin and under jaw. A snipey or weak muzzle is undesirable. There must be a moderate amount of chiselling to the foreface below and to the side of the eye. When viewed from the side the skull should be flat, the planes of the foreface and skull parallel and of equal length. When viewed from above the skull tapers into the muzzle. The lips are tight and clean and the nose is large with open nostrils. The nose colour in all dogs will be a solid colour with no pink or patches of light pigment and shall complement the background colour of the dog, except in the merle where some pink pigment is acceptable.

6) Topic: NBCC Annual General Meeting

Rationale:

Member clubs need to be given sufficient notice of an upcoming meeting.

EYES Existing Standard

Eyes - The eyes are set wide apart, oval shaped of moderate size harmonising with the colour of the coat but darker colour preferred, except in the case of chocolate where a lighter colour is permissible and in the case of merles where blue is permissible. The expression is mild but keen, alert and intelligent.

Amended

Eyes – The eyes are set wide apart, oval shaped of moderate size harmonising with the colour of the coat but a darker colour is preferred, except in the case of chocolate and merle where a lighter colour than the coat colour is permissible. In merles it is also permissible to have a blue eye, blue flecking or partial blue eye. The expression is mild but keen, alert and intelligent.

HINDQUARTERS Existing Standard

Hindquarters □ The hindquarters are broad and muscular, in profile sloping gracefully to the set on of tail. The thighs are long, broad, deep and muscular with well turned stifles and strong hocks, well let down, and when viewed from the rear are straight and parallel.

Amended

Hindquarters – The hindquarters are broad and muscular. The croup should slope gently, not be steep or flat and in profile sloping gracefully to the set on of tail. The thighs are long, broad, deep and muscular with well turned stifles and strong hocks, well let down, and when viewed from the rear are straight and parallel.

COAT Existing Standard

Coat □ Double coated, with a moderately long, dense, medium textured topcoat while the undercoat is short, soft and dense, making a weather resisting protection, with abundant coat to form mane, breeching and brush. On face, ear tips, forelegs (except for feather), hind legs from hock to ground, the hair is short and smooth.

Amended

Coat – Double coated, of moderate length. Topcoat dense of medium texture, straight or slight wave but never curly. Undercoat is short, soft and dense, making a weather resistant protection, with abundant coat to form mane, breeching and brush. Hair is short and smooth on face, ear tips, forelegs (except for feather), and hind legs from hock to ground.

COLOUR Existing Standard

Colour □ Black and white, blue and white, chocolate and white, red and white, blue merle and the tri-colour black, tan and white. In each case the basic body colour must predominate and be the background colour of the dog.

Amended

Colour – A variety of primary body colour's are permissible in bi-colour, tri-colour or merle combinations. White markings may be clear or ticked, but white should never dominate. Colour and markings are always secondary to the overall physical evaluation. In each case the basic body colour must predominate and be the background colour of the dog.

Solid colour: black and white, blue and white, red and white, chocolate and white.

Tri-colour: solid body colour with white markings and tan point's ie black tri, blue tri, red tri, chocolate tri.

Merle-colour: solid body colour with merling pattern (splashed/marbled), white markings and/or tan points ie blue merle, red merle, and chocolate merle.

The following motion to be considered when appropriate notification to member clubs and timeframes have been met.

Motion: The NBCC to submit the above Breed Standard amendments to the ANKC for consideration at their next meeting.

5) Topic: NBCC position of Secretary

Rationale:

Members Clubs were asked to nominate persons for the position of Interim Secretary via e-mail sent on 2 February 2006 to member clubs.

The position of Interim Secretary has been filled by Bev Scott.

The role of Interim Secretary will continue until a Secretary is voted in at the next AGM.

Motion: Breed clubs are asked to nominate persons for the position of Secretary by the due date.

AGM's should be held where possible where it is likely that delegates and other members would be present to attend. Royal National Shows (RNS) often have interstate members visiting to attend these shows. To allow for sufficient notice of an AGM the next RNS of member clubs would be the Brisbane Royal in August. The date of the AGM will be determined by the host state and is intended to be within the dates of the RNS or as close as possible and will also take into account the travel plans of the delegates.

The following motion to be considered when appropriate notification to member clubs and timeframes have been met.

Motion: The NBCC will hold it's AGM within or as close to the Brisbane Royal as possible.

7) Topic: Compulsory testing for Ceroid Lipofuscinosis (CL)

Rationale:

One of the objectives of establishing the NBCC was to address the health concerns of the Border Collie. Demonstrates to the public that as breeders of Border Collies we take the health status of the dogs we produce seriously and are committed to producing sound healthy dogs. With the development of a DNA test for CL breeders are able to choose appropriate mating combinations and as a result never produce an affected offspring. The CL DNA test is easily accessed by everyone and requires a visit to your local vet or participation in organized clinics. Currently we have enough dogs available in the gene pool DNA tested Normal to make the suggested combinations viable. Dogs are permanently identified (microchip or easily read tattoo) prior to DNA samples being taken. The ANKC will survey all Members of Canine Councils/Associations who are owners of registered Border Collies as this requirement places restrictions on registering individuals. The ANKC survey is conducted through the Canine Councils/Associations journals. If you do not fulfill the requirements you will not be able to register offspring. We are to provide guidelines to the ANKC as to which results will be acceptable and which will not. Voting on the following motion will not determine if this health test will be compulsory rather you are voting on whether to request the ANKC to undertake a breed survey.

The following motion to be considered when appropriate notification to member clubs and timeframes have been met.

Motion: The NBCC to request the ANKC conduct a breed survey regarding the compulsory testing for CL of the sire and dam prior to registering their offspring based on the following guidelines.

Acceptable Combinations and offspring will be registered:

DNA tested clear dog to clear dog = all offspring clear.

DNA tested clear dog to carrier dog = acceptable as this will not produce any affected pups. Offspring will be clear or carrier.

DNA tested clear dog to affected dog = acceptable as this will not produce any affected pups. All offspring will be carriers.

Not Acceptable Combinations and offspring will not be registered:

DNA tested carrier dog to carrier dog = this mating could result in affected offspring and therefore should be carefully considered eg. effects of disease, severity of disease, quality of life, alternative options available and so on.

DNA tested affected dog to affected dog = all offspring will be affected.

In Favour [] of conducting a breed survey Against [] conducting a breed survey

8) Topic: Compulsory testing for Collie Eye Anomaly (CEA)

Rationale:

The same rationale applies to this topic as that outlined for topic 7.

The following motion to be considered when appropriate notification to member clubs and timeframes have been met.

Motion: The NBCC to request the ANKC conduct a breed survey regarding the compulsory testing for CEA of the sire and dam prior to registering their offspring based on the following guidelines.

Acceptable Combinations and offspring will be registered:

DNA tested clear dog to clear dog = all offspring clear.

DNA tested clear dog to carrier dog = acceptable as this will not produce any affected pups. Offspring will be clear or carrier.

DNA tested clear dog to affected dog = acceptable as this will not produce any affected pups. All offspring will be carriers.

Not Acceptable Combinations and offspring will not be registered:

DNA tested carrier dog to carrier dog = this mating could result in affected offspring and therefore should be carefully considered eg. effects of disease, severity of disease, quality of life, alternative options available and so on.

DNA tested affected dog to affected dog = all offspring will be affected.

In Favour [] of conducting a breed survey Against [] conducting a breed survey

9) Topic: Compulsory screening/scoring for Hip Dysplasia (HD)

Rationale:

The same rationale applies to this topic as that outlined for topic 7 with the addition of the following.

To obtain a true breed average all X-rays taken should be submitted for scoring.

Other breeds have demonstrated that similar scheme's over time reduce the breed average

We do not have a true breed average as all x-rays taken have not been submitted for scoring.

Setting an acceptable score ourselves is more realistic.

Using a combined score allows more pairings rather than marking each dog against an absolute number eg 8 or 10.

Examples of combined scores which would be acceptable i) Sire's total 14 Dam's total 6 = combined 20 ii) Sire's total 9

Dam's total 4 = combined 13 iii) Sire's total 0 Dam's total 20 = combined 20.

The following motion to be considered when appropriate notification to member clubs and timeframes have been met.

Motion: The NBCC to request the ANKC conduct a breed survey regarding the compulsory screening/scoring for HD of the sire and dam prior to registering their offspring based on the following guidelines.

Acceptable requirements for registering offspring will be that the combined Hip score of the sire and dam will total 20 or less.

In Favour [] of conducting a breed survey Against [] conducting a breed survey

ADDITIONAL ATTACHMENTS FOR NBCC AGENDA ITEMS

10) That delegates can approve expenditure of NBCC funds of up to \$300 rather than to continually seek approval from member clubs at their meetings. The current process is very restrictive and prevents the smooth running of the NBCC. (As per No. 1)

11) Nominations for full term secretary. (As per No. 5)

12) Merle to Merle Matings – This motion was passed through NBCC member clubs and then passed over to ANKC in 2005.

In 1999 due to the debacle of restricting Rottweillers registrations the ANKC resolved that before any breeding restrictions were put into place. “ANKC will conduct Breed Surveys when a National Body or, in its absence, a Breed Club or interested owners and breeds apply to the ANKC to have a disease noted as a recognisable and significant problem that needs to be addressed.” As of last year we do not believe, the policy on breed surveys has changed. A breed survey should appear in the official organ before any litter registration limitations are imposed on any breed, which in turn affects your freedom of choice.

The process of this motion we believe was not carried out correctly. There was no survey done through the State Journals in order to allow owners who were not members of BC Breed Clubs to be able to participate/vote.

The NSWBCC Inc asks for a review of the process of the motion. Should it be revoked and the proper process then applied?

13) NSWBCC Inc would like to ask that a process for future changes to breeding practices etc be reviewed and that breed surveys are carried out before any changes are made.

14) Hereditary Disease Testing – Hip & Elbow, CL & CEA. NBCC have previously had a motion which was not carried. NSWBCC Inc was amongst the no vote for this motion. We however felt at the time that the ideals behind the motion held merit. Further investigation into this concept would be appreciated. As Per 7,8, & 9.

15) ISDS Registration - ISDS registration is recognised for Border Collies in the UK, USA, Canada. Could there be discussion on “is it viable for Australia to recognize ISDS onto our Kennel Club registration”. As per 3.

16) The NBCC AGM should be held on the same week-end each year. The only variable then would be the venue. Each state member club should have a turn at hosting the AGM. By having a set date for the AGM it would alleviate the need for the constant correspondence and communication that is presently required in an effort to set a date. Each delegate would then know well in advance then the AGM is to be held. We believe also that the AGM should not be held in conjunction with any member club’s show/trial as this has the possibility of leading to disruptions and stretching of resources for both the AGM and the show/trial. It should also be a “face-to-face” meeting so as to alleviate the chance of misunderstandings, complications etc arising from Discussions and the such.

17) The procedure for the change over of the NBCC bank account details and official papers on changing of the Secretary. How should this occur? When should it occur and who, apart from the secretary, should hold information regarding bank account details. The information needs to be readily made available and accessible to any new Secretary or President.

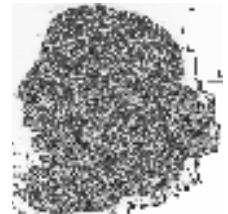

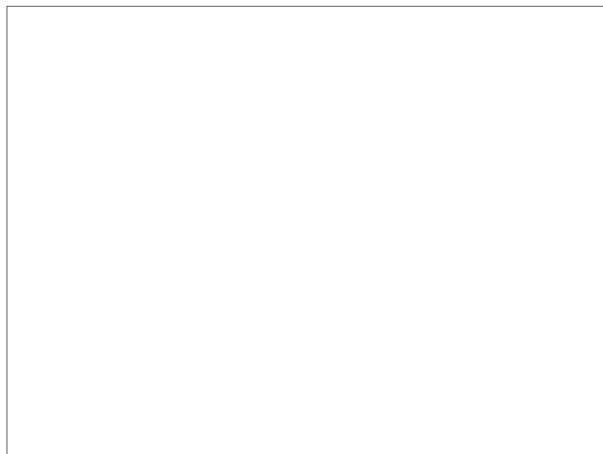
