AGENDA ITEMS FOR THE 2007 CONFERENCE OF NATIONAL BREED COUNCILS

1..

Re submit the following item to the ANKC for consideration at the 2007 meeting of the National Breed Council. When this item was submitted in 2006 we were not informed of the correct procedure (to have another Council second the motion from those attending the meeting) however we are now aware of the procedure for submitting such items.

Topic: Recognition of International Sheep Dog Society (ISDS) registered Border Collies in Australia

Background: International Sheep Dog Society (ISDS)

“In 1873 the first recorded sheep dog trials were held in Bala, North Wales, but it was not until 33 years later that the International Sheep Dog Society (ISDS) was formed, following a meeting of English and Scottish sheepmen in 1906. Shortly afterwards the first International Trials were held in Gullane, Scotland and, except during the war years, have continued to be an annual event.

Now, almost a hundred years later, the ISDS has over 5,000 members from all over the world - and not just from the obvious sheep concentrations such as Australia and New Zealand, but also from the Americas, South Africa, The Falklands, Scandinavia, the Middle East and the continent of Europe, to say nothing of a growing interest in Japan! Each year sees quite a few of our overseas members in the U.K. as spectators at our National and International Trials. They come, not only to see the finest dogs in competition and to learn from their handlers, but also to assess the dogs' ability for their own requirements 'back home' - wherever that may be - and then seek to buy the dogs, or more specifically their progeny. The U.K. is very much the 'kennel of the world' as far as the working sheep dog is concerned.

A Purpose

The ISDS was founded with the intention of stimulating interest in the shepherd and his calling and to secure the better management of stock by improving the shepherd's dog. This is still the intention today, for without a good working dog the work of the shepherd, both on the hills and the lowlands would be impossible. One good dog can do the work of a dozen men, as the shepherd is the first to testify. Indeed British agriculture owes a tremendous debt to these hard working collies and all too often, perhaps, their efforts and praise remain unsung - but they are never under-estimated! So the constant improvement of these dogs is a prime requirement.

To help to facilitate this, in 1955, the Society produced its first Stud Book in which pedigrees had been researched back to the early 1900s, commencing with the famous Old Maid. Today, the pedigrees of over 6500 puppies continue to be registered each year and in 2000 the 250,000th dog was registered. Records are compiled under the direction of Mr Norman Lorton, who took over as Chief Executive and Keeper of the Stud Book in 2001. The Stud Book of the ISDS is the principal work of reference concerning such pedigrees in the world. It is therefore invaluable for those serious breeders who continue to seek excellence in the working sheep dog, conscious of the part that pedigrees play in enhancing the skills of the breeder and assisting him to produce better and better dogs. “

Rationale:

Our current Australian Border Collies originated from imported ISDS registered dogs.

The ANKC therefore recognised these ISDS dogs and issued ANKC registration to their offspring.

Many countries Kennel Clubs recognise ISDS registration and grant their own equivalent registration when these dogs are imported. ISDS dogs continue to enter the ANKC by way of registration with other Kennel Clubs from around the world when these dogs are imported into Australia.

We are unable to find when and why the ANKC ceased to recognise the ISDS registration. It may be that for some time no one applied for recognition of ISDS dogs and with changes to technology and staff this may have been overlooked.

Being able to utilize the ISDS dogs within Australia would provide an increase to the genetic diversity available.

The Border Collie is regarded as the world's premier herding dog and members would again like to utilise the attributes offered by ISDS registered dogs.

We do not expect there to be a high demand due to the costs associated with importation and so on. ISDS dogs have been imported into Australia and New Zealand from the earliest times and there continues to be a small flow of these dogs into Australia. However these dogs are currently unavailable to be utilized by ANKC breeders.

National Breed Council agenda items need to be submitted to the ANKC by 29th May to be considered at their next meeting.

The following motion to be considered when appropriate notification to member clubs and timeframes have been met.

Motion: The NBCC write to the ANKC requesting that ISDS registered dogs be recognised in Australia and granted ANKC registration.

This was voted on in 2006 and the result was below, please advise if your members want the NBCC to re-present this item again.

2. **MOTION:** That the ANKC Administrator send out the minutes electronically to clubs.

Rationale: If this process is agreed to this would hopefully not only cut down the workload of the ANKC administrator, but also NBC secretaries as the minutes and agendas could be onforwarded via email, thus saving time, paper and added expense to NBC's who are required to photocopy ANKC correspondence to all member clubs.

All member clubs could be forwarded the minutes/agendas at a faster rate therefore allowing member clubs and NBC's more time to organise feedback from their members and meet with the ANKC timeframes.

3. **MOTION:** That the ANKC administrator send out the agenda electronically to clubs.

Rationale: Electronic distribution of data is a common business practice that is time, and cost effective. The current practice from ANKC in distributing material to Clubs in hard copy requires many hours for the ANKC administrator at photocopier, collating, stapling, sorting, placing in envelope, addressing and mailing out. By sending information electronically, this can be achieved by attaching file to email with a large distribution list which saves time and money. Clubs are in receipt of information quicker, and the cost of producing/ mailing large amounts of hard copy is no longer borne by the ANKC

4. **MOTION:** That the ANKC conduct a breed survey of owners of registered border collies in relation to whether there should be litter registration limitations on puppies from merle to merle matings.

Rationale: ANKC policy stipulates that before any litter registration limitations are placed, a breed survey is conducted with owners of registered dogs affected by the proposed limitation, prior to any limitation being placed. A breed survey placed in the official organ of all Canine Controls by the ANKC allows ALL registered owners of the breed to participate in the decision, not just a minority that may be members of a breed club, or the lesser number that attend a breed club meeting. Breed Club membership continues to fall across all breeds, even less members of breed clubs are members of the local Controlling Body. A breed survey open to all owners of registered Border Collies is a fair, and transparent means in which to give all owners opportunity to participate in the decision making process. It should also be noted that merle to merle matings occur in other breeds, and at this time, no restrictions are placed in those breeds. However it is not unreasonable to view ANKC may in the near future wish to impose limitations on such matings, as to be exclusive on limitations in one breed defies logic and cries discrimination

AGENDA ITEMS FOR THE 2007 NBCC AGM

A) SUBMISSION FROM BCCTas TO NBCC – BREED STANDARD

1) Motion

Amend the Australian Border Collie Breed Standard so that it is completely consistent with that of the United Kingdom Kennel Club Standard: in effect adopt the United Kingdom Kennel Club Standard as the Australian Standard.

Rationale

The *Border Collie* is now an internationally recognized breed

As such there should be a common international standard that protects the integrity of the breed so that *all the characteristics that define the Border Collie* are preserved

The rationale of this motion that the UK Kennel Club Standard should apply is that the Border Collie originated in Northern England, Scotland and Wales, that the widest gene pool of the breed exists in that region and that by adopting the Standard of the Country of Origin the integrity of the breed is most likely to be preserved.

Having different individual National Standards will lead eventually to individual national variants, this probably destroying the integrity of the breed or certainly threatening any potential international competition. Potentially this could result in, say, the top Border Collie recognized throughout Europe either being ineligible or unacceptable for showing and/or breeding in Australia: surely a ridiculous scenario.

A common standard would also facilitate the use of international judges, of particular benefit to an isolated country such as Australia, without them having to adapt their judgements according to the idiosyncrasies of the host country. This would be of similar benefit to Australian judges prospectively viewing the wider world judging scene.

One argument for an individual National Standard is that it allows the development of an animal more suited to the local conditions. However this argument ignores the fact that it is one thing to set a standard based on what the breed is wished to be, or what the fashion of the day is, but quite another to establish the standard based on what the breed actually is with respect to genetic makeup, size, conformation, alertness, eye, instinctive behaviour: all those elements that make up what is the Border Collie.

The former approach will eventually create either a variant of the breed or a new breed that looks like the original but lacks the fundamentals. Any changes made to the Standard to restrict one or more of the genetic elements of the breed run the serious risk of so reducing the gene pool that undesirable deficiencies may arise.

This motion is not suggesting the Australian Standard automatically adopt each and every change made to the UK Standard as and when they are made, rather that such changes are thoroughly evaluated here before adoption or otherwise, through the normal voting channels. Ideally arrangements should be negotiated between the UK Kennel Club and the ANKC., allowing Australian input into any proposed changes. This is no different from that which already occurs in a wide range of international agreements between other national bodies.

Such adoption still allows breeders, if so inclined, to breed Border Collies along populist lines and facilitates those who breed to retain the Border Collie's overall abilities, characteristics and instinctive behaviour which are shown to such great effect in many disciplines.

The proposer would apply the same reasoning to the Australian Cattle Dog, Kelpie and the Dingo. Who could legitimately argue against the Australian National Kennel Council setting the Standards for those dogs?

B) SUBMISSION FROM BCCNSW TO NBCC – BREED STANDARD

Item 1. That the ear carriage be changed to again include “rose ears”.

Rationale

- Since the removal of this type of ear carriage from the breed standard many Border Collies are having their ear carriage artificially changed to semi erect.
- The change is done either by surgery or taping (strapping) the ears.
- Breeders/exhibitors who are ethical and not adopting these measures are being penalized.

Because of this practice of artificially changing ears, unaware breeders maybe using stud dogs or bitches that do not have a natural semi-erect ear carriage.

Item 2. That the Breed Standard Colours to be changed to

Colour – A variety of primary body colour’s are permissible in bi-colour, tri-colour, merle or sable combinations. White markings may be clear or ticked, but white should never dominate. Colour and markings are always secondary to the overall physical evaluation. In each case the basic body colour must predominate and be the background colour of the dog.

Solid or bi-colour: black and white, blue and white, red and white, chocolate and white, lilac and white.

Tri-colour: solid or bi-colour with white markings and tan point’s ie black tri, blue tri, red tri, chocolate tri, lilac tri.

Merle-colour: solid body colour with merling pattern (splashed/marbled), white markings and/or tan points ie blue merle, red merle, and chocolate merle.

Sable: dark tipped coat over a background colour that is usually red or tan (more a pattern than coat colour, but naturally occurring in the breed) with white markings.

Rationale

The Border Collie is a versatile breed successful in many disciplines. The current gene pool of ANKC main registered Border Collies frequently produces colours which are not described in the present standard. Many dogs of current non-standard colours have desirable characteristics (including structure or conformation) which are valued by their owners who may wish to breed from them to maintain such traits. These dogs of non standard colour may also excel in performance activities, and are thus valuable to contribute to gene pool for these events.

Australia (1994) current standard is.....

Colour - Black and white, blue and white, chocolate and white, red and white, blue merle and the tri-colour black, tan and white. In each case the basic body colour must predominate and be the background colour of the dog.

Standards from around the world

The Kennel Club (Britain 1988) Origin of the Border Collie

Variety of colours permissible. White should never predominate.

South Africa (2003)

Variety of colours permissible. White should never predominate.

America (2004)

The Border Collie appears in all colors or combination of colors and/or markings. Solid color, bi-color, tri-color, merle and sable dogs are to be judged equally with no one color or pattern preferred over another. White markings may be clear white or ticked to any degree. Random white patches on the body and head are permissible but should not predominate. Color and markings are always secondary to physical evaluation and gait.

New Zealand

A variety of colours is permissible, but white should never predominate.

FCI Standard Group 1, 297 (1988)

FCI members use the standard from country of origin, that is the standard from Great Britain.

Some member countries that use this standard are: Argentina, Belgium, Brazil, Culumbia, Croatia, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, India, Irland, Italy, Neverlands, New Zealand, Russia, South Africa, Sweden & Switzerland

Australia is the only country which has restrictions regarding body colour in the Border Collie standard, which in turn impacts on import and export of dogs that currently do not fall within the Australian breed standard for main registration. The Border Collie has a narrowing gene pool in Australia, within which occurs a number of genetically linked disorders. Limitations in colour severely compromises breeders, (and exhibitors) choice in seeking new additions to the gene pool that are from countries overseas. It remains foremost in the minds of the breeders that form, function, temperament and structure are of utmost importance, and that choice of colour is of an individual preference.

Item 3. That the Eyes colour in the standard be changed to: Mid to dark brown in black pigmented dogs. Mid to lighter brown in other pigment colours. Blue eyes or part blue eyes are permissible in merles.

Item 4. That the Nose colour in the standard be changed to: The nose colour shall determine the basic pigment colour of the dog. Pigment colours are black, chocolate (brown), blue (slate)& lilac. Red Coat Colour may occur with any of the four pigment colours. The nose is to be fully pigmented except in the case of merles which may have partial pigment.

Rational for items 3 and 4

To correct the current standard which does not make sense genetically and to bring it into line with the expanded coat colour section.

C) *SUBMISSION FROM BCC Qld TO NBCC –*

1) Topic: Membership of the three NBCC working parties

Rationale:

At the 2006 NBCC AGM the coordinators of the three working parties were appointed.

- The working parties are
1. Health
 2. Training and Education
 3. Breed Standard

Membership of these working parties has not been updated

Without the current membership and contact details the coordinators cannot move forward

It is each Member Club's responsibility to keep the NBCC Secretary current with their one nominee for each of these working parties

When the Member Club submit their nominee for each of the working parties, they are to supply the nominee's name, address, e-mail and phone number.

The nominee's contact details to be forwarded by the NBCC Secretary to the working party coordinator.

With permission of the nominee, their name, e-mail address and phone number to be displayed on the NBCC web site.

Before you vote.....please read & consider:

The Green Eyed Monster!

Thirty odd years ago, full of enthusiasm and having, with no malice aforethought, produced a litter containing a puppy which was not black, I went along to a meeting of the club which then catered for the Border Collie seeking information and direction. As the discussion intensified one very, very angry long time breeder took the floor and, attempting to explain how allowing coloured dogs would ruin the breed, made the comment "Once you start crossing blue dogs with yellow ones, we'll end up with green dogs"! Sadly, he was not laughing at the time.

It is frustrating and quite sad to find that after all this time the colour debate can still engender anger, argument, ill feeling and proposals based on ignorance. I, for one, object to voting on proposals which are based on mis-information and which should never be presented at ANKC level.

Unfortunately, a number of the proposals which come through to be voted on have three fundamental flaws; firstly, that border collie breeders want to maintain the true Border Collie type and characteristics, secondly that we all know what that is, thirdly that we all agree on what that is, fourthly, that somehow colour governs what is a true border collie, fifthly that everyone understands breed genetics, sixthly Best I stop at three!

I am more than convinced that there are almost as many concepts of what a 'true' or 'proper' border type is as there are breeders and it is not realistic to think that once we have 'all colours acceptable' that we'll have a better chance of producing correct type. We may need to add a few more changes such as 'all ear carriages acceptable'; all hock lengths acceptable, all coat lengths acceptable smooth coats, for example, and so on.. Again, it is interesting to note a proposal such as 'all coat colours acceptable' then being modified with riders relating to ticking, patches, white not predominating etc. Does this mean that a predominantly white border collie cannot be true type? If so, then what determines type and how is it that a predominantly black dog can be 'true to type' but not a predominantly white one? Or does type then mean 'personal preference'? Of course, there could be sound reasons for these modifications but my study of the history of the border collie shows an awful lot of predominantly white dogs! But maybe I'm missing the point; maybe 'type' means 'show quality'; and what a can of worms that is!! More importantly, when are we going to put to rest misconceptions relating to eye colour, nose colour and pigmentation? To allow eyes to harmonise with coat colour is as it should be; to then add 'darker' colour preferred is a contradiction. Blues and chocolates cannot be expected to have the eye pigment of black coated dogs as the gene which alters the coat colour alters the eye pigment as well. Reds, on the other hand, can have both lighter (chocolate genotypes) and darker (black genotypes) eye pigment. None of these coloured dogs should be penalised by judges looking for something which is genetically impossible in this breed. And if we agree on 'all colours acceptable' then of course we must take into account the eye and nose pigmentation of chocolate tricolours and blue tricolours. Black eyelids ? Why? Or if this is read as 'black eye rims' (presumably for sun protection?) what about the blues and chocolates where the pigment will never be black? Now black, slate or liver on the roof of the mouth (appropriate to the coat colour) and on the pads could be something to think about. Hopefully without putting my foot in my mouth, I have to wonder why the feet and pasterns are often overlooked? After all, in nearly all of the disciplines that this breed is involved in it relies heavily on its feet. But, we've been through it all before. I believe most of us are willing to embrace meaningful change but it needs to be based on sound genetics and facts; not much point in changing the standard to compel breeders to achieve what is genetically impossible or factually improbable.

So, do we all agree that we want to maintain the essential characteristics of the beautiful border collie and if so, where do I find them?
